any factors went into the decision-making process concerning the implementation of the E-Hall-pass software. First, I have had experience with the software

in previous school settings and have seen the program implemented very effectively in dealing with monitoring classroom hall passes. The great aspect of the E-hall-pass system is the ability to monitor the system electronically. When students create an "exit ticket" from a classroom, an electronic time-stamp is given to the ticket. With this information, it is very easy to determine when a student is cutting class by giving actionable data via the time-

stamp. Also, in situations where the security cameras are not available, the software gives the administration details as to where a student was supposed to be and the amount of time the student was out of class. In the light of the highly publicized issues with school shootings and violence, E-hall-pass gives our school another added layer of security by enabling the administration to have actionable data concerning student whereabouts and the exact times students leave and return to the classrooms. Likewise, in the event of a school emergency, the software provided first responders with a list of students who are unaccounted for in classrooms. During times of crisis, this could be life-saving information. Given the many benefits of the E-Hall-pass software, it was an easy decision to implement something that helps keep our students and campus safer. In my opinion, anything that aids in the safety process is worth the cost and effort.
